# **BIG NEWS**



DONALD Trump had his Twitter and Facebook accounts suspended last week, after supporters of the US president stormed the Capitol Building (the US parliament) in Washington DC, leading to five deaths. The president's online posts have been blamed for starting the riot.



President Trump was accused of encouraging the angry mob. He gave a speech to a crowd of his supporters near the White House, just a short walk from the Capitol. During the speech, Mr Trump repeated his false claims about the election being stolen from him, and urged people to "stop the steal".

The invasion of the Capitol started soon after Mr Trump's vice president, Mike Pence, started the session to officially approve the result of the election. Many in the crowd were angry with the vice president, and some were chanting that they should "Hang Mike Pence". Some set up a noose outside the Capitol.

#### **Letting their guard down**

The police who were meant to guard the Capitol were heavily criticised for their poor preparation and lack of resistance. One even posed for a picture with protesters – he has since been suspended from duty. Many critics said that Black Lives Matter supporters were treated much more harshly at protests throughout 2020.

Opponents of President Trump, including some in his own party, were due to begin the impeachment process [accused of committing a crime in office] this week. Mr Trump is due to leave his job this month anyway, so some people think an impeachment trial is pointless, but some of his opponents say it would help to block him from running for president again in four years' time.

## Losing control

The protest overshadowed an enormous bit of good news for the incoming president, Joe Biden. In the US state of Georgia, two people from his Democratic Party were voted into the Senate (the upper house of the US Congress, which is sort of like our House of Lords. The House of Representatives is the lower house, like our House of Commons). This means that Mr Biden's party will have control of the Senate and he will have much more freedom to run the country how he wants.



It also means that President Trump has become the first US president since Herbert Hoover in 1932 to lose an election and control of both houses of Congress in the same term.

It was only after the invasion of Congress that Mr Trump finally conceded defeat in the election. He also said that he wouldn't attend the inauguration ceremony (where Joe Biden takes up the job) on 20 January.

#### How free should speech be?

The decisions of Twitter and Facebook to block President Trump have started a big debate about free speech. Many people have accused the big tech companies of bias against Mr Trump and his supporters, and say that other world leaders have posted worse things online.



Lots of people who think Twitter is biased signed up to Parler, an alternative social media site that says it defends free speech. However, Parler has been accused of hosting all kinds of violent and offensive content, so Apple and Google have removed it from their app stores. Amazon have now stopped hosting Parler's site on its servers.

#### Starting point

• Trump repeated his false claims about the election being stolen from him.

#### **Development**

He urged people to "stop the steal".

#### A3. What is meant by the "impeachment process"?

READING SKILL — Find and explain information

Possible answer

#### Starting point

• The impeachment process is used when a government official is accused of committing a crime in office.

#### Development (some further research/discussion might be needed for this part of the answer)

• A trial is held and if the defendant is convicted, they are removed from office and disqualified from holding any federal (national government) office in future.

#### A4. Define the following terms:

- The House of Representatives

Possible answer

#### Starting point

• The Senate is the upper house of the US Congress and the House of Representatives is the lower house.

#### **Development**

• The Senate is a bit like our House of Lords and the House of Representatives is like our House of Commons.

READING SKILL — Find and explain information

#### Possible answer

#### Starting point

• Parler is an alternative social media site to Twitter and Facebook. It says that it defends free speech.

#### **Development**

• However, Parler has been accused of hosting all kinds of violent and offensive content. Consequently, Apple and Google have removed it from their app stores: Amazon have stopped hosting Parler's site on its servers.

# B1. Mike Pence is Donald Trump's vice president, so why were Trump's supporters directing their unacceptable chants and anger at him?

READING SKILL — Infer information and justify with evidence from the text

#### Possible answer

#### Starting point

• Trump's supporters were angry with Mike Pence because he was overseeing the session to officially approve the result of the election, which Trump lost.

#### **Development**

• However, despite what the protesters might have thought, Pence's role was only ceremonial. The new president's term would have begun at noon on 20 January regardless of whether the losing side had formally conceded.

#### B2. Why have the police guarding the Capitol been heavily criticised?

READING SKILL — Infer information and justify with evidence from the text

#### Possible answer

#### Starting point

• The police who were meant to guard the Capitol have been heavily criticised for not being prepared for the attack and for their lack of resistance.

#### **Development**

• The police have been criticised for letting the protestors get as far as entering the Capitol building. This has led to the assertion that the police did not take the attack seriously enough and this criticism has been supported by a picture of a police officer posing for a picture with protesters. Indeed, many critics have said that Black Lives Matter supporters were treated much more harshly when they protested throughout 2020.

# B3. Opponents of President Trump were due to begin the impeachment process this week. What are the main arguments for and against an impeachment trial for Trump?

#### Possible answer

#### Starting point

<ul> <li>His online posts have been blamed for starting the riot in which five people died and this has brought his leadership into question.</li> <li>Trump's opponents, including some of his own party, feel that his refusal to concede his election loss and his seeming support of the protesters, threatens democracy in America. They feel that it is inadvisable to let him remain in power any longer.</li> <li>If Trump loses an impeachment trial then it will prevent him from running for office again in four years' time. His critics feel that this would be a good thing.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Trump is due to leave his job at the end of this month anyway, so some people feel that an impeachment trial is pointless.</li> <li>Pence argues that Trump's opponents are playing political games in calling for an impeachment trial and that such a trial would inflame the situation.</li> </ul>

#### Possible answer

## Starting point

• It is significant because it means that Mr Biden's party will have control of the Senate and he will have much more freedom to run the country how he wants.

# Development

• Furthermore, it wasn't until he lost control of Congress that Mr Trump finally conceded defeat in the election. He has become the first US president since Herbert Hoover in 1932 to lose an election and control of both houses of Congress in the same term.

#### **B5. Why have Twitter and Facebook blocked President Trump?**

READING SKILL — Infer information and justify with evidence from the text

#### Possible answer

#### Starting point

• Twitter and Facebook have blocked President Trump because of accusations that his posts incited his supporters to riot. They don't want to be associated with violent protests or to be seen to condone such behaviour.

#### Development

• However, some people think that these companies are biased against Mr Trump because other world leaders have posted worse things online.

#### Part C

#### C1. Comment on the use of language in the subheading, "Letting their guard down".

READING SKILL — Recognise effect of language choices

#### Possible answer

#### Starting point

• The subheading uses word play on "guard". Those that let their guard down stop being alert. In this case it is the guards who let their guard down!

#### **Development**

• Therefore, the use of wordplay highlights the criticism of the police guarding the Capitol because it is their job to be alert.

#### C2. Look at the structure of the report. Suggest why the section about free speech is at the end of the article.

READING SKILL — Identify benefits of text organisation and presentation

#### Possible answer

#### Starting point

• The section about free speech is not essential to an understanding of what happened when supporters of Donald Trump stormed the Capitol Building. Therefore, the information about who was involved, where it happened, what happened, when and how appears at the start of the report.

#### Development

• However, the issue of free speech is relevant because of the decision made by Twitter and Facebook to block Donald Trump's account due to the incident. Therefore, it is addressed at the end of the report for readers to think about and form their own personal views. It adds interest.

Traditional publishers are not allowed to publish harmful content so it is right that social media sites should block Donald Trump if his posts are deemed harmful.</li> <li>People are twisting the definition of free speech. It is right that people should be allowed to articulate their opinions and ideas. However, this does not mean that violent, offensive and illegal views and ideas should be given a platform.
